



The Royal British Legion West Felton Branch

In 1922 ex-Servicemen of West Felton formed a sub-branch of what was then called the "British Legion" under the jurisdiction of Oswestry. The main branch at Oswestry supplied the main officials. From 1946 onwards many ex-Servicemen and women joined "the Legion" at West Felton.

By 1948 West Felton membership was between 60 and 70. A committee was formed and it was decided that they would form a separate West Felton branch. This was achieved in March 1948.

THE FIRST OFFICERS OF THE NEW WEST FELTON BRANCH WERE:

President: Brig. D Richards, Twyford, Chairman: Richard (Dick) Hamlett, Haughton, Treasurer: Thomas (Tom) Davies, Rednal, Secretary: Glyn Jones, Queens Head.

Amongst those who joined after WWII was Colonel John Kenyon of Pradoe who served in the Burma campaign as a young subaltern with the Seventh Indian Division which stood fast at Arakan and helped gain the first land victory over the Japanese. The troops fought magnificently, led by two of the best leaders every produced by Britain: The Earl Mountbatten of Burma and Lieutenant-General Sir William Slim. By June 1944 the Fourteenth Army had been involved in bitter fighting for three months, with Imphal under siege and a battle raging at Kohima. These twin battles, for vital junctions on the map of Burma, marked the turning point in the Far East war.

As a mountain gunner the young subaltern, John Kenyon, shared the daily slog of a regiment which carried its guns and other supplies over the hills by mule. It has been said the Burma campaign was "A war of mules, porters and air supplies – often not even ieeps."

John Kenyon won the Military Cross during his war in Burma and his Indian radio assistant received the Military Medal. For 24 hours the two played their part in directing allied guns to fire on strongly fortified Japanese bunkers.

Col. Kenyon was proud of his association with loyal Indian troops on active service. He is particularly proud of their stand in the Arakan with its famous victory, followed by the long trek to Kohima carrying the guns over almost impossible terrain.

> When you go home tell them of us and say, for your tomorrows we gave our today.

The Kohima Epitaph is engraved on the Memorial of the 2nd British Division in the cemetery of Kohima (North-East India) and is recited at Remembrance events.

Time for changes

The last words of Helen Dillon's Garden Book is "Change is everything". Change when you want it can be exciting but change when it is forced upon you can be a damned nuisance. However, many of us will sure to be making changes this winter following the critical review of our gardens, and probably it will be for a mixture of reasons. The basic fact is that gardens are not static but are living things that continually develop. Plants get too big, others decline due to old age (don't we all), there are new varieties to tempt us, while fashions and our taste are subject to change. Certainly, I have my list ready and am excited by some of the plans.

A pleasurable October job is ordering seeds which will all be done via the internet. I can vaguely remember when ordering was done by post and then later by telephone or possibly fax until the internet became universal. A change that maybe was not exciting but certainly very welcome, if only for the speed. We will try and be a bit more adventurous than usual and try some new varieties. One change for us will be that we made a midsummer resolution to cut down on bedding. Hence, we will be ordering more perennial seed than usual and also ordering plants. The reason for this change is simply that it is hoped to reduce labour in future years, but we are also excited

by how the new plans will look.

There will be no change in that October is when the glasshouse heating gets turned on and the glass cleaned. The outdoor grapes will be picked and our miniscule vintage got under way. Most apples are picked this month and the last of such things as squash harvested. Then it is clearing parts of the vegetable garden and, a sure sign of impending winter, a start made on pruning of trees and shrubs. Where power assistance is desirable, we now use cordless tools as they have developed to be plenty powerful enough in recent years.

Another notable thing from Helen Dillon's books is that I was taken aback by the amount of work she put into her garden and the amount of time she lavished on her plants. For example, using vast quantities of bone meal and compost when planting, not to mention the size of the planting hole. Then there is the whole watering can per pot in summer—there would be no time to sleep. The time spent is far more than I can afford and I can't believe that many professional gardens get such treatment nowadays. Most of us have so many things calling on our time and that spent in the garden has to be rationed. She actually says that the detail makes the difference between a garden looking fine and looking terrific. I will have to remain just aspiring to be fine. ♦



the nuclear umbrella for peace (mostly) since the Second World war would probably be going a bit too far for them. They also made the mistake of writing it in Latin, causing the Senior Tutor to remark that the grace was not so much an insult to the Lord as to the Latin language.

Saying Grace, giving thanks or gratitude, is even more remarkably associated with well being. A study of health professionals showed that those who made a note of being thankful were less prone to stress and depression. Another series of studies begun 20 years ago has shown that gratitude is important in developing and maintaining social engagement and development whilst motivating people to behave in ways that benefit others. Giving thanks is associated with other

positive traits such as happiness and forgiveness.

The undergraduates of Newnham, in establishing a Grace, have identified the value of a ritual that has eluded the lawyers of Lincoln's Inn. A form of grace is recognised by most of the world's religions. Some of these Graces are quite long but commonly invoke some form of deity. There is evidently a need for a brief form of Grace that can satisfy all religions. The Latin Grace 'Benedictus benedicat - let he who is blessed bless (this food)' does at least not specify who is blessed. Atheist graces are rather bland, emphasizing the communal aspect but without giving thanks. The ancients may inadvertently have got it right leaving their successors to struggle with finding a universal formula including bonding and thanks. ♦

GRACE BEFORE MEALS

Michael Davie

Before we sat down to our Harvest Supper, a Grace was said. Many authors confirm that when a community or family eats and drinks together, group identities are nourished. From the earliest times food and drink were suited to playing a rôle in rituals expressing cultural values and social relationships including any ancestors or gods who might have shaped the world. A hundred years ago saying of Grace before meals was commonplace, but it is now rarely said outside of a religious community, or colleges, particularly when they had previously been a religious foundation. The custom of saving grace varies from country to country. A study in America suggested that almost 50% of Americans say grace before meals at least once a week. Recently the saying of Grace before meals at Lincoln's Inn (a legal institution) was discontinued. The Treasurer felt that it did not provide a setting where all felt equal

The word Grace is derived from Latin meaning 'thanks'. Although many Graces used in this country have a Christian background, references to the Lord stating that God should be blessed for food appear in the book of Deuteronomy about 1400 years before Christ. Jesus himself gave thanks before the Last Supper. Giving thanks before a meal to a deity is not confined to Christianity: most other religions have some

form of blessing before eating and give thanks to a superior being.

Atheists of course have a problem with grace because they do not believe in a superior being. Advice given to atheists advocates that it is polite to take part in the grace but atheists should not cross themselves. A few seconds of quiet before a meal is not only a ritual, but gives people time to think and has been said to re-inforce a shared sense of purpose and identity. Since the earliest times eating together has been recognised as a force for social cohesion.

The saying of grace before a meal became a sensitive subject to the undergraduates of Newnham College, Cambridge some years ago. Newnham was founded as a women's college and was anything but a religious institution. (Up until 1948 women could not be awarded degrees by the University: female undergraduates were awarded a titular BA, unfortunately abbreviated to BA tit). The Undergraduates at Newnham felt that the saying of a Christian grace before a meal was meaningless to those who were not of that faith, yet they recognised the value of having a grace as a means of creating an institutional bond and creating a common purpose that looks beyond the 'self'. The undergraduates wrote a new offering of thanks for food, companionship, and peace. The problem they had was to whom they were giving thanks: farmers for food perhaps, companionship –each other possibly, but thanking



Lest we forget . . . Remembrancetide is a

fortnight from the end of October to Remembrance Sunday, and includes the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal.

Wearing a poppy is a show of support for the service and sacrifice of our Armed Forces, veterans and their families.

- It represents all those who lost their lives on active service, from the beginning of the First World War right up to the present day.
- It also honours the contribution of civilian services and the uniformed services who contribute to national peace and security, and it acknowledges innocent civilians who have lost their lives in conflict and acts of terrorism.

The poppy has been a symbol of Remembrance for over 100 years. It became a symbol of Remembrance and hope for a peaceful future in the aftermath of the First World War. There is no 'correct' way to wear a poppy. Wearing a poppy is a personal choice reflecting individual and personal memories and hopes for peace. It's a matter of personal choice whether and when someone chooses to wear a poppy and how they choose to wear it. From the new plastic-free paper poppies to pins, bag charms and pet poppies, the best way to wear a poppy is simply with pride.

The poppy is red because that's the natural colour of the poppy flower. During the First World War previously beautiful countryside was blasted, bombed and fought over, again and again. The landscape swiftly turned to fields of mud where little or nothing could grow. But out of this devastation the delicate but resilient bright red Flanders poppies grew and flourished in their thousands.

The red poppy directly supports the Armed Forces community. The red poppy is worn as a show of support for the Armed Forces communities across the UK, Allied Forces and the Commonwealth. Donations from the sale of red poppies go directly towards helping the Armed Forces community.

Money raised during the Poppy Appeal helps support the Armed Forces community in lots of different ways, including providing financial advice to veterans who struggle to adapt to civilian life and funding recovery services like the Battle Back Centre, the first port of call for wounded, injured and sick service men and women as they start their Individual recovery programs.

West Felton has long held a fine reputation for donating to the Poppy Appeal. Door to door collections can still be expected as well as the usual red Poppy collection boxes in shops and public houses. Times are hard now, so it must be even harder for injured service people and their families. Let us remember them. ◆





Rector WG Haslehurst (1891-1905) The HASLEHURST INSTITUTE

The original hall was rather less than half the size of the present building, financed by a legacy left by Rector W G Haslehurst, and built on land given by the Congreave family. The Haslehurst Memorial Institute was opened on 12th October 1908, and used for various parochial purposes, chiefly for the Men's Club though





in the 1920s the Girl Guides also held their meetings there, with Miss Langford in charge. Later on, the Institute building was enlarged. Originally there was no drainage system. For a number of years the building was leased to the Shropshire Education Authority, for the use as a school canteen. The Educa-

tion Authority installed cookers and washing facilities along with a septic tank in the adjoining field as a temporary drainage system. 

Behind the house was the main garden, separated by a tall hedge from the kitchen garden with its orchard, a heated greenhouse, a cobbled courtyard with stable-block for three carriages and six horses, harness room, workshop, stores, and groom's cottage. Amongst other relics of the past we found a horse's leather boot, one of a set the horse would have worn to protect the lawn during mowing, and many other Victorian tools whose uses we could only guess at. At the bottom of the garden had been a tennis court, we were told.

The rectory was replaced in 1963 with a ries. West Felton, and amongst others, new house on the lawn. After the family had moved in, we dismally watched the demolition of the old building. The capacious cellars now served as receptacles for rubble, so their tile-topped storage surfaces and brick arches are

still there for future archaeologists, under the new estate. In the roof were found marks indicating the presence of recycled ships' timbers. The staircase was destroyed; nowadays it would have been dismantled and sold.

The most valuable asset to the demolitioners was the huge amount of lead from the roof. The reason given for the demolition was the high cost of maintenance, given the size of the building, but it wasn't in bad condition, and would have converted into flats. Around this time similar decisions were being made over the future of many similar country rectories: Whittington was demolished, making way for the A5 straightening, while Selattyn and Welsh Frankton, with their great views, were sold off and converted.

The importance of the rural parishes was reflected in the size of their rectowas a richer living than Oswestry because the farms produced most of the wealth, a state of affairs that had existed for centuries, but was now changing as the farms became mechanized and people moved off the land to work in



At Home in West Felton Rectory 1956 to 1974 - Ned Millington

We arrived in West Felton from our Black Country roots in the first week of April 1956: dad was taking up his new position as the rector and we were four children (soon to be five) who'd never properly seen a bale of hay up close; so imagine the shock for the new inhabitants of the old rectory to find themselves surrounded on all sides by farms. There was Hanmer at the Court, Richards opposite the Court, Roberts at the bottom of the garden, and of course Evans the Manor adjacent to St. Michael's. Church and rectory with two tied cottages occupied an island, and the ancient site was full of powerful spring scents, vivid colours and tumultuous noise, with the jutting perspectives of vast, overbearing trees clutching at us. Our town cat, let out of her box after a few days, went crazily on a slaying spree for a week until, realising she couldn't kill everything at once, she tuned in to the seasons of the countryside and gradually the rate of attrition slowed.

We were overpowered by the scale of nature, and quite besieged by agriculture on our island. However, all the farms were open to our prompt inspection, and got it. The first or second afternoon we ventured over to our closest neighbour, the Manor, to soak up the smells, the pre-milking quiet, and the vast scale of everything. A

block of black-country slums would have fitted into that yard, but the lucky animals, it seemed to us, had it all to themselves - even their own house for milking! The big attraction was the dutch barn, full of handy construction materials for increasingly complex dens. As we got to know our new friends Bill Martin and Dood Lindop, we learned rapidly the names and functions of everything on the farm, and this knowledge translated onto all the other farms. There was a transaction involved - we had to do a bit of work, and later on drive the Fergie, whose heavy clutch caused consternation to its lightweight drivers and brought down hails of curses from the men atop the rickety wagon loads of hay bales. Dai Evans paid us for the summer holiday's labours; for me the sum of eleven shillings comes to mind (how that was calculated I had no idea), together with bacon hacked off the ceiling hooks and as much buttermilk as you could, or could not, drink. The late suppers continued into the corn harvest. Mr Hulse's threshing box would be set up in the stackyard, connected to the tractor's power take-off, and then all hell let loose as the machinery tried to shake itself to pieces. Corn came out at one place and straw bales were shunted out at another -that was as technical as it

got for me. The dogs, Sweep and Ken, stood sentry for escaping rats, and when these had been cornered Bill and Dood ran in to finish them off with pikels. Despite the complete absence of the Ellis's on Tedsmore Bank and the safety concerns we managed to avoid serious injury. it was not like our earlier life, where we walked to school across a post-war industrial landscape, past bomb-sites, and factories which opened directly onto the streets and showered streams of sparks across the pavement as we walked by. However, informality and a need for awareness governed both those very different existences.

My elder brother Robert and I were given bicycles very early, and these proved both a boon and a burden. We could visit far-flung friends and farms, but the bikes came with responsibilities: they needed looking after, and there were errands to run and expectations made upon us, such as delivering parish magazines. The bikes survived a casual disregard for maintenance as we gained a wider overview of the area, until cars became accessible, and farms gave way to garages. We both started out at West Felton School, a Victorian building with three classes and open fires, and on transferring to secondary schools in Oswestry, for the first time the village seemed to shrink.

We had brought a television with us in 1956 which just about picked up 'Hancock's Half Hour' and 'The Lone Ranger' in its room on the top floor of the rectory, but when it broke it wasn't replaced, and we were bereft until kind people in all corners of the parish started inviting us to watch their sets: Evans The Manor, the Wards at The Willows, the Phillips's and the Martins on the A5, Blurtons at Ford's Bank were all among those who took pity on us.

The rectory building itself was interesting. Fifty-two rooms I counted, with most having domestic functions, including an entire servants' wing with two cellars, its own cobbled courtyard (with workshops, store-rooms and a central well) and another working yard at the back (containing two privies, one a double-seater) walled off from the garden so as not to spoil the view. The top floor of the house would have provided accommodation for servants in residence. Bell-pulls in all the living-rooms led to a numbered board at the bottom of the servants' back stairs. This paralleled the grand staircase, which was lit by a wonderful skylight. Harry Phillips, who was born in the 1880's, remembered over twenty servants being employed at the rectory in late Victorian times, and they would have remained mostly invisible unless summoned. The two disused reception rooms with their french windows swallowed entire garden fetes in wet weather, but twothirds of the house we could find no use for except as a gigantic all-weather playground. Thus outdoor sports such as cycling, glider-flying and even an airrifle range found homes in the servants' wing.
