



and for information for those who were unable to.

Some news now relating to an issue that has been ongoing for some time.

When Dennis Edwards Ltd built Alma Close, they transferred to what is now Shropshire Council, a piece of land, adjacent to the Close that included a public open space and space for a play area. They also made a payment to Shropshire Council for the provision of play equipment. The money has been held by Shropshire Council since then, and the parish council has asked Shropshire council on many occasions to release the money to enable us to purchase new equipment for the playing field on Tedsmore Road. Shropshire Council have said they were unable to do this as the residents of Alma Close may not agree with the suggestion to spend the money on our existing play area. We're very pleased to say that the residents of Alma Close have recently written to Shropshire council giving their permission for the monies held to be released and used for new equipment on the Tedsmore Road play area. Our thanks go to the residents for their help and co-operation in this, and we'll keep you all updated with what happens next.

Have you made a complaint about care at home or in a residential or care home in Shropshire in the last two years?



Whilst people often receive a very good standard of social care in Shropshire unfortunately there can be times where issues arise or things go wrong. When this happens you may feel that you need to raise a formal complaint about the care you, or a loved one, have received.

Healthwatch Shropshire are looking at people's experience of going through the complaints process with local social care providers or Shropshire Council. They want to know if people achieved the outcome they sought through the complaint but also their experience of making the complaint; did they feel supported, did they have the information they needed, how they were treated and if they felt listened to.

Lynn Cawley, Chief Officer of Healthwatch Shropshire, said, "Everybody has a right to complain about their care when they feel that it has not gone as well as it should have done. We know from our experience how difficult it can be for people and relatives to go through the process as it often involves raising difficult issues, from a distressing time in their lives, which can be emotionally challenging."

"Every social care provider, from domiciliary care providers to care homes to Shropshire Council has a complaints procedure for people to follow. We would like to hear from people who have either lodged a complaint or have considered lodging a complaint and decided against it in the last two years. We can then use these experiences to work with the health and social care sector to highlight where things are working well with the complaints process and where there may be room for improvement."

People can share their experiences with Healthwatch Shropshire through an online survey https://www.smartsurvey.co.uk/s/HWSComplaints or by contacting them by phone on 01743 237884.

Healthwatch Shropshire is the independent health and social care champion in Shropshire. It gathers the views and experiences of patients, service users, carers, and the general public about services including hospitals, GPs, mental health services, community health services, pharmacists, opticians, residential care and children's services. It also has statutory powers that it can use to influence service provision by encouraging improvements. •

Is there anyone in West Felton who thinks they would enjoy the production of Round and About West Felton? The Magazine Committee would love to hear from you.



We are happy to report production of Round and About West Felton is running smoothly. The change of deadline necessitated by lengthening delivery times from the printers was well received and allows the Distribution and Delivery teams comfortable time scales, especially in bad weather. It is essential that the magazines are delivered before the 1st of each month to ensure fair publicity for those events scheduled for the first week of the month.

ADMINISTRATION is under control. Dealing with the bank is totally online. Expenses are reduced to the bare minimum. The main expense was postage of invoices and magazines to out-of-area advertisers, this has almost been eliminated; it now applies only to those with no email address. Volunteers give generously and freely of their time, petrol and other expenses.

ADVERTISING: We continue to maintain a balance between paid advertising and West Felton information, public notices and items of interest, in the hope of entertaining and retaining our readers. New advertisers take the place of those retiring or leaving the area. Some advertisers cancel because they have too much work! Because of the regular turnover. there is a noticeable increase in design and layout of advertisements. New & existing advertisers are entitled to amend or change their ads when they need to.





Queens Head, a hive of industry

THE UNION at Queens Head

The Union Inn at Queen's Head was built around the time of the construction of the



canal, taking the name from the Shropshire Union Canal which was completed in the 1840s.

It was the meeting place for navvies working on the canal; hard-working, drinking men. It was said a man was killed in the bar and the blood-stained floor remained forever, no matter how much it was washed and scrubbed.

David Griffiths was the Innkeeper in 1921, had been there for at least 10 years. He gives his age as 64, but ten years before on the 1911 census he said he was 48 - unlike his wife Deborah who was 50 in 1911 and now, ten years on, she is only 54! One son, David Edgar lived at home, aged 26, he was a farm labourer.

Later Innkeepers were a Mrs Williams and after the war, Ike Kendrick and his wife Dora, late of Willow Crescent.

The Union Inn and the row of cottages including the Jubilee Cafe were demolished in the 1960s.



Op the Garden Path with Topiarius

Visit gardens, new ideas

June is not a good time for a gardener to go on holiday but it is a good time for garden visiting. Hence, we pray we can get number one son to water the glasshouses and we can go on our annual three day break to enlarge our garden experience. This year we are back to the Cotswolds and, amongst other places, hope to visit Bob Brown's nursery. Last year we went to Lincoln and visited several very interesting gardens, notably Walled Garden Baumber, but were greatly disappointed by Gunby Hall. It is a reminder that we all have different ideas of what makes a great garden. However, what is almost guaranteed is that you will learn something new, even if it is what not to do. Another reminder is to look at the Yellow book/NGS web site for gardens opening nearer home.

The perceived wisdom is not to be too hasty to throw out dead looking plants as they could just be very slow in recovering from winter. However, I think we will draw the line in June and fear that losses will be more than usual. For example, after I boasted that our pittosporums were fine, they promptly dropped their leaves. Losses did not always follow what might be expected, and live or die could be very dependent on exact position. Grevillea in a pot on the terrace suffered not a bit, all coprosmas died except one with its pot inside a larger container, and only the

smaller salvia Hot Lips survived in a cold glasshouse. Just more of the surprises that plants can throw at you. I had been a little apprehensive that astilbes that suffered a bit last year in the hot weather might not pull through, but back they came as good as ever. Perhaps we should be optimistic and see losing things as a chance to get something new.

When not visiting gardens or buying new plants there is still plenty of work to do at home. Not least will be the continued assault on weeds and there is a fair chance of watering becoming necessary. Early in the month we expect it to be safe to plant out bedding and also to move on tomatoes, peppers and cucumbers. I will also be planting out runner beans sown last month in large modules, which I have found safer than sowing direct. We now sow leeks in modules and they will be planted out under a fine mesh tunnel. The brassicas will be planted out in succession through the month from sprouts to kale. Maincrop carrot can be sown, as can, for example, lettuce, spring onions and peas for succession. Further sowing this month include sweet corn and chard.

The beans will need supports put in place and the vegetables will welcome some Growmore if not already applied. Last but no least, my notes say that the first of the new potatoes will be enjoyed. ◆



THE TOLL HOUSE

18th century road maintenance was the responsibility of the parishes through which the roads passed, but they did not have the resources to keep the roads in good repair. A turnpike road was a toll road operated under a trust set up by an Act of Parliament. The Act authorised a group of trustees to levy tolls on a stretch of road in order to finance its maintenance and improvement. The turnpikes were wound up in the 1870s and the responsibility for road maintenance passed to the Highways Board. The Queens Head tollhouse was still standing in 1860. John Jones (more about him later) built a steam mill at Queens Head, deemed the tallest building in Shropshire at the time. He demolished the toll house and built a shop and bakery.

The Montgomery Canal is part of a whole network of canals called The Shropshire Union canals.

In 1793, the Ellesmere Canal Act was passed for making a canal from the Severn at Shrewsbury to the Mersey in Chester, this would pass through several parishes including West Felton, Queens Head, Wootton & Rednal. After years of competition, but finally cooperation, the canal system gave way to the new invention of the railway.

Fly-boat - Ellesmere Port was the hub of the Shropshire Union's operation, fly-boats left daily for such destinations as Birmingham, the Potteries, Llangollen, Shrewsbury, Welshpool, Newtown and Trench (Telford); dropping off and collecting goods at many intermediate points.



The boats themselves were the ultimate development of the art of wooden narrow boat building, considered probably the finest narrowboats ever built. They had to have a unique combination of fine lines, light weight, fast performance and great strength. The **Shroppie Fly** represented the peak of the craft of wooden narrow boat construction before the final decline of canal transport.

From 1853 to 1862 there was a fly-boat service on the canal from Newtown to Rednal Station. The journey from Newtown took approximately 5 hours, the return journey 7 mins less. It covered 32 miles and had 22 locks to negotiate; the speed achieved gives great credit to the design of the boats, some 68 feet in length, and the maintenance of the towpaths. The horse teams would have been changed several times during the journey.

Along the straight mile from Queens Head, by the bridge at Heath House, there is a half timbered building, this was a warehouse, but canal passengers would have disembarked there to walk the short distance to Rednal Railway Station. First

(and Catholicism) differ from these groups in how the fruits of prosperity should be shared. Should it be forced (such as tithing) or should it be voluntary? Those that believe that sharing should be voluntary turn to St Paul again in the verses preceding those quoted above. Here St Paul says "And here is my judgment about what is best for you in this matter. Last year you were the first not only to give but also to have the desire to do so. Now finish the work, so that your eager willingness to do it may be matched by your completion of it, according to your means. For if the willingness is there, the gift is acceptable according to what one has, not according to what one does not have". Paul appears to be saying that there must be a desire to give - almost to the extent that in itself giving (charity) is something worthy.

Catholics may feel affronted that PR

proclaims much that the Catholic Church preaches. Both support the right to earthly property, though the belief that the Bible has promised prosperity to believers may be a step too far for Catholicism. Both regard giving as important and both churches run social programmes. PR may go further than the Catholic Church in the degree of coercion in giving. There are probably many other issues, such as birth control and abortion that tend to move people away from the Catholic Church.

That said, the Catholic Church has the largest number of followers of any Christian church. It hosts some of the world's finest buildings. And it has shown itself to be remarkably resilient to all competition, and has shown a significant ability to adapt over the years. Prosperity religion may well succeed if the accumulation of earthly riches is followed by Christian charity.



class tickets cost 5 shillings and second-class 3 shillings. Poorer people could not afford the complete journey and probably used it over the shorter distance to the markets at Oswestry and Welshpool.

The construction of a rail/canal transhipment basin at Rednal was carried out in the late 1850s to oblige the Great Western Railway, which until then had no means of getting its goods into Llanymynech, Welshpool and Newtown areas other than by the Shropshire Union Canal.

Rednal Bone Works - Rednal boneyard was in operation until the 1950s. The business moved from the Maesbury boneyard in the 1890s to the towpath warehouse already mentioned. There was no road access to the site adjacent to the Great Western Railway track at Rednal. All goods delivered would have come and gone by canal barge. Animal carcases were brought from far and wide, even as far as Liverpool. They were boiled and stripped of fat and tissue which was then reloaded onto barges and taken to Port Sunlight in the Wirral to be made into soap. The bones were finely ground for fertiliser. The firm also supplied sulphate of potash, nitrate of soda and super phosphate of lime, the raw materials being imported by canal. According to an elderly local resident, the works was also used during the war to manufacture gunpowder. Richard Hamlett of Heath Houses, Rednal, used to work at the bone yard after the second World War, as did his father before him. After WW1, the products from the bone works were taken by road. Unable to compete with larger port-based firms, the bone works ceased



PROSPERITY RELIGION

The whole teaching of Jesus Christ was crammed into three years — three remarkable years it may be said that changed the world, albeit helped along by the Roman Empire becoming Christian following Constantine's adoption of Christianity. Many wish that Christ had spent longer explaining matters more deeply given the different interpretations of what he or his apostles said.

Whereas the Catholic and Orthodox churches have more or less managed to keep their flocks together, Protestantism has spawned many different branches. Often these have apparently diametrically opposite interpretations of the Bible. A new branch of Christianity, the so called Prosperity religion (PR), has come to challenge the Roman Catholic Church in many countries particularly in South America. Indeed in Guatemala and Honduras it is set to overtake the Catholic Church by 2030. On present trends it may have equal numbers as the Catholics in Brazil by 2035. PR has its roots in 19th century America. It came to prominence through a famous sermon delivered by Russell Conwell, a Baptist minister. Conwell equated poverty with sin and asserted that anyone could become rich through hard work.

PR believes that well-being is a Christian entitlement and that this includes good health and prosperity. Adherents maintain that Christians have been given power over the world, and other living things. In the sacrifice of Jesus on the cross in which he died to rescue mankind from sin, PR interprets this rescue as including the alleviation of sickness and poverty. PR asserts that earthly wealth is to be regarded as a sign of divine blessing. This may be based on the parable of the Talents;" For to everyone who has, more will be given, and he will have abundance; but from him who does not have, even what he has will be taken away". These claims have struck a chord amongst the poor in cities. How therefore does PR differ from its competitors?

PR has been welcomed by some branches of the Pentecostal church. Other Christian churches including some evangelicals and Christian socialism do not hold earthly wealth in high regard. They emphasize sharing, taking their beliefs from such writings as Paul's 2nd letter to the Corinthians: "that now at this time your abundance may supply their lack, that their abundance also may supply your lack—that there may be equality". A degree of reciprocity is indicated. Apart from ownership, PR

Just as I finished the item about the flyboat, with the old photo of SATURN on page 20 - I read an article in the ADVERTIZER (*Ed.*)

A community arts group has welcomed a famous historic canal boat back to the town. Members of Fizzgigs welcomed Saturn, the last remaining Shropshire Union flyboat, to Ellesmere.

Built in 1906, the boat was returned to the town's Canal & River Trust's Maintenance Yard, Ellesmere.

Saturn, originally horse-drawn, on this occasion was towed to the Yard by another special boat, a motor called Beatty, built in 1937, owned by Nick and Liz Grundy.

Saturn will be moored at the Canal & River Trust's Maintenance Yard Ellesmere for large parts of the summer, including the weekend of June 3 and June 4 when Fizzgigs be putting on a show called 'Bridging the Gap'—a family-friendly show, to be performed at 2pm and 4pm.

John Yates, Chair of Saturn Flyboat, said: "She looks at home, she feels at home. she is at home."

Village Hall memories 65 years out of the 100!!

West Felton Village Hall 1923:2023

from another proud Feltonian

"In the 50s I remember going to see **TOP CLUB** this was when they had a Young Farmers Club in the village, and they had a variety show when all clubs competed against each other.

"Also early on I believe they had dancing every Friday evening and jive evenings. Whist Drives were a popular evening out when the hall could be packed with tables, even on the stage, when people came to try and win their turkey for Christmas.

"Weddings breakfasts and birthday parties were celebrated and the school put on their plays at Christmas.

"The British Legion later started Bingo which ran every week for years, now we just have Easter and Christmas Bingo, still very popular. The Legion Harvest auctions used to be a big fundraiser for the Poppy Appeal. 'Recycling' before it was even a regular thing".

"Youth Club was also a big thing for the youngsters, Mrs Stockbridge ran it for some time and Rob Millington the vicar's son was chairman. I remember we went to the theatre to see the Rocking Berries, great excitement. Once the youth club put on a variety show for the OAP of the village and did the food for them.

"When Rev Brannigan was here the village put on two pantomimes "Cinderella in wellie boots" and "Jack and the Beanstalk", great homemade entertainment.

Anyone fancy doing another? We just need a producer?

"Sport has always been played in the hall, badminton for years and still going, table tennis and in later years indoor bowls. There is also Pilates, Tai Chi and Flexor classes for the people who want to keep fit."

"WI has always used the hall and are a massive support to everything in the village. their Christmas Fayres alternating with St Michael's Church down the years. And now we have Lenten Lunches and Harvest Suppers, and regular Male Voice Concerts by local choirs, especially in November for the Poppy Appeal. More recently we have fundraising events for the Methodist Chapel, some really exciting shows and events.

"Our village hall is a great asset to the village. The committee, though small in number, do a great job in keeping it looking great, so here's to the next 100years! Anyone who feels they would like to join the committee would be very welcome, just get in touch with lan on 01691 610224."

Canal Restoration and the Village Hall

Montgomery Waterway Restoration Trust was formed to save the canal network from the threat of new roads and motorways. Restoration began in 1969, in Welshpool, in response to a plan to use the canal route for a by-pass. In the 1950s when there were breaches of the banks, the railway companies, which then owned the canals, did not repair them, and the canals became derelict. By the 1960s, at Queens Head the canal was overgrown, silted over in places.

Around the millennium, West Felton village hall was occupied every weekend by gangs of volunteers who cooked big meals and slept on the floor after a hard day's digging out the canal at Queens Head. A core team of experi-

enced engineers managed the project with volunteer work parties visiting week by week. You can now enjoy the fruits of their hard labour. As each section was completed, they moved along the canal to another site.

Sand Pit - During the excavations around the old canal-side building at Queens Head, the brick lined tunnel complete with rails and sleepers was revealed. This led under the building and under Rednal Road from the canal wharf to the sand pit in a field on the far side of the road. Donkeys pulled tubs of sand (see Loading Wharf pic.) for loading onto boats bound for Maesbury. This was still in use well into the 20th century. The tunnel has now been covered over and the building restored for use by the Paddle Club.



"Reflecting back to the days when I was a boy attending West Felton Primary School, the



highlight of the week was Youth Club held in the village hall on, I think it was a Tuesday night. With all our school friends we could have fun with table tennis, five-a-side football, games etc., - great times for youngsters.

"A couple of standout situations I can still recall to this day. Once, I was playing table tennis and getting really hot, a lad called Gary Bullock handed me a small bottle of orange pop which I slugged down with gratitude - until he told me he'd weed in it! He thought it was funny - I did NOT!

"Another incident was when we were playing 5-a-side football - a fight broke out between myself and Edwin Butler, only to be broken up by Mrs Butler who ran the Youth Club. She sorted it out by hitting both of us with about the head with a wooden bat. No messing in those days. Boys were boys - and mothers were ...

"Another outstanding memory was winning the jackpot at bingo in the hall. As I remember it was run by John Stockbridge and Maurice Jennings on a Wednesday night. I won £20, a lot of money back then. Next Saturday I went into Oswestry and in a shop called STONE-DRI on the corner of New St and Bailey St, run by Paul Eke, I kitted myself out with a bomber jacket, new shirt, Oxford bags and platform shoes - Did I think I was "The Kiddie"? Oh, yeah! Happy Days." ◆
