
It has been said the Burma campaign was "A war of mules, porters and air supplies – often not even jeeps."

John Kenyon won the Military Cross during his war in Burma and his Indian radio assistant received the Military Medal.

For 24 hours the two played their part in directing allied guns to fire on strongly fortified Japanese bunkers. The barrage was laid just 25 metres ahead of allied troops.

Col. Kenyon is proud of having been associated with loyal Indian troops on active service. He is particularly proud of their stand in the Arakan with its famous victory followed by the long trek to Kohima, carrying the guns over almost impossible terrain.

This epitaph is engraved on the War Memorial to commemorate the men who fell in the Battle of Kohima:



When you go home tell them of us and say, for your tomorrows we gave our today.

After the war, Col John Kenyon attended the Staff College at Camberley, then was posted to the Suez Canal Zone; Germany; London; and the Far East, where he was military adviser in Far East Land Forces under General Sir Nigel Poett.

In 1966 he was appointed to the Joint War Staff as GSO1 at Head-quarters, 1st British Corps, in Germany, and appointed OBE. His last appointment was as defence attaché at the British embassy in Brussels.

After retiring from the Army in 1973 to run the family estate at Pradoe, he was a keen supporter of the Animals in War memorial in Park Lane, which celebrates the great contribution made by Mountain Artillery mules.

He was chairman of Freemen of England for some years,

A war hero, former county councillor, and a dedicated supporter of West Felton Royal British Legion, Colonel John Kenyon MC, OBE died aged 84 in 2006.



A tribute to THE **FOURTEENTH ARMY IN BURMA**

From press reports on 6 June 1994

On 6 June 1944, while the eyes and hopes of untold millions were focussed on the Normandy beaches, a forgotten army of British troops and their allies was fighting a decisive battle half a world away.

The men of the gallant Fourteenth Army have never been given the credit they deserved for their efforts in the Burma campaign.

Overshadowed by the momentous struggle in Europe, the jungle fighters first stopped the crushing Japanese advance on India, fighting the longest War, and then launched the campaign that was to drive the enemy out of Burma.

It was a great achievement in conditions quite unlike the European scene with its good, modern roads and rolling farmland. Today, 50 years on, there are still men and groups anxious to right the

wrong that has left their success story in limbo.

One of these men is Colonel John Kenyon of Pradoe, who served in the campaign as a young subaltern with the Seventh Indian Division which stood fast at Arakan and helped gain the first land victory over the Japanese.

The troops fought magnificently and were led by two of the best leaders every produced by Britain: The Earl Mountbatten of Burma and Lieutenant-General Sir William Slim.

By June 1944 the Fourteenth Army had been involved in bitter fighting for three months with Imphal under siege and a battle raging at Kohima. The twin battles for vital junctions on the map of Burma marked the turning point in the Far East war.

The Japanese had made a determined effort to break into India but only continual battle of the Second World gained a toehold before being pushed back relentlessly until they were forced to guit the major towns of Rangoon and Mandalay.

SALC provided guidance which is set out in the document 'Guidance - Flying flags: a plain English quide'. The attachment of flags to what is called 'street furniture' may need permission but there is no restriction on flying the Union or the St Georges flags. In the case of West Felton, any such permission should be sought from Shropshire Council as I am advised they are responsible for the highways and its 'furniture' in the village. The police equally advised that we had no jurisdiction as any suggestion that these incidents were racially motivated is not a matter for the PC but for the police to investigate and decide if there is any criminality involved as set out in the Race Relations Act 1965 and subsequent legislation.

On behalf of parishioners we discharged our duty as a PC to escalate the issues higher. The Police reported that the banner/graffiti on the bridge had been recorded as a possible criminal matter. It was also reported to National Highways department and has been removed.

You may have read in the Shropshire Star that West Felton is seeking to create a Neighbourhood Plan and that the initial application for the designation of a Neighbourhood Area went before Shropshire Cabinet on 10 September. On 8th September Cllr John Thornhill (Chairman), Cllr Ozcan Ozagir (Vice Chairman), Rosemary Wood (Parish Clerk) met with Shropshire Council staff - Eddie West (Head of Planning Policy), Rosie Corner (Policy & Neighbourhood Planning Officer). A Neighbourhood Plan is a community-led document that provides a vision for future development in a local area, allowing residents to influence where new homes, shops, and offices are

In March 1944, the Japanese launched an attack on British bases behind the Indian Border in Imphal and Kohima. These battles saw some of the worst fighting of the Second World War.

At the same time, a second Chindit expedition began, the second-largest airborne invasion of the Second World War with 20,000 British and Commonwealth soldiers and air support provided by the 1st Air Commando, US Army Air Force.

At the Indian base of Kohima, 2,500 British-Indian troops defended Garrison Hill against 15,000 Japanese. In one area, only the width of the District Commissioner Charles Pawsey's tennis court separated the two sides. When relief forces arrived, the British defensive lines were reduced to a shell-shattered area of only 350 square metres.

The resolute defence by British and Indian forces, and the monsoon, defeated the Japanese. They had now been broken by multiple battles, and after fierce fighting, central Burmese cities Meiktila and Mandalay were captured in March 1945. This was the decisive battle that effectively ended Japanese hopes of holding Burma.

The route south to coastal city Rangoon was now open, and it was a race between the 14th Army and the start of the monsoon. Lieutenant General Slim requested support from the Royal Navy, who redeployed from nearby areas, resulting in a combined air and seaborne victory on 4 May.

Colonel John Kenyon - Colonel John Kenyon won an immediate MC as a mountain gunner in the Burma campaign during the critical battle of Kohima; some 35 years later he waged a successful campaign to restore his county council's name to Shropshire instead of the government-approved Salop.

John Frederick Kenyon was born on December 30 1921 on the Pradoe estate near Oswestry, Shropshire. He was educated at Marlborough, and joined the Royal Artillery in 1941.

Kenyon was posted to 5 (Bombay) Indian Mountain Battery, part of 25th Indian Mountain Regiment in India. His unit, as part of the 7th Indian Division, was involved in intense fighting in Burma from 1943 to the end of the campaign. Within a month of going into action, Kenyon's legs had swollen with ulcers, but a parcel from home containing a medication normally prescribed for pregnancy cured him.

He developed a lasting affection for his mules. One night during close quarter fighting in the Arakan, a mule was badly wounded close to his trench. He got out to dispatch it, then returned to find that the trench had been destroyed by a shell.●

Burma Campaign

'If mankind is lucky, it may be that the end of the Burma campaign was the last great battle in the last great war; and even if it wasn't, it may still be worth remembering from an

ordinary foot-soldier's point of view.'

- George MacDonald Fraser, author and veteran of Burma.

Burma was a part of the British Empire during the Second World War, so when Japan invaded Burma in January 1942, the British and Commonwealth troops who had been driven out of the area began the struggle to reclaim it.

The fighting lasted until July 1945, and British Forces - made up mostly by the British Indian Army, Gurkhas and divisions raised in Africa - experienced incredible hardship, stirring leadership, tactical innovation and inspiring bravery.

Retreat - The Japanese captured Rangoon, the capital of Burma, in March 1942 and began to drive the British out of the country. To avoid being surrounded by enemy Forces, the British began to retreat up the Irrawaddy and Sittang valleys in appalling conditions – including crossing difficult terrain, and in the worst dry and hot weather of the year - and against determined enemy forces.

On 15 May 1942, just after the monsoon broke, defeated British Forces finally retreated all the way across the Indian border. It was the longest retreat 14th Army to take over offensive operain British history, covering a distance of 1,000 miles - like walking from Birmingham to Rome.

Stalemate - After their retreat, British Forces in India immediately started forming plans to recapture Burma, though the next year saw very little progress.

In the early months of 1943, the 77th Indian Infantry Brigade under Brigadier Orde Wingate began Operation Longcloth, driving far behind Japanese lines into the heart of Burma.

The 3,000 man brigade, nicknamed 'the Chindits', included British Army and Gurkha regiments and eight RAF sections and signallers. They sabotaged railway lines to limit the movement of the Japanese, and encouraged Burmese resistance groups. However, they suffered heavy casualties. 818 men were killed, wounded or missing – 27 per cent of the original force.

Despite their limited results, the Chindits had shown the Japanese were not invincible in the jungle. The British public was inspired by their mission and their operation raised morale among other British troops.

Advance to victory - 'I have been kicked by this enemy in the place where it hurts, and all the way from Rangoon to India where I had to dust off my pants. Now, gentlemen, we are kicking our Japanese neighbours back to Rangoon.' – Lieutenant General William Slim to the 11th East African Division, Palel Plain, 1944.

Shropshire Council Report: Aug/Sept 2025

July was again a busy month - Over 30 meetings, 500 emails and 300 teams messages, plus site meetings with residents. Things generally slow down in August each year as people take their holidays. No time for me to take a break just yet as things continue to find their new level.

Shropshire Council completed the withdrawal of the draft local plan and issued a new 'call for sites' as part of the evidence gathering process, in preparation for restarting the local plan review process next year. We have also launched the 10-week consultation on the Local Natural Recovery Strategy (LNRS) at the Burwarton and Minsterlev shows. The 'call for sites' and the LNRS consultation run up to October. The 'call for sites' is for anybody who owns or has an interest in land to put their site forward for consideration to be included in the local plan allocation. The LNRS by contrast is for anybody who has an interest in owning, managing, working or using land and our green spaces, to comment on the strategy. The strategy aims to make the most of those spaces and to assist in nature recovery in those areas. The consultation includes a map of the whole county of identified sites. In other news Children's Services at Shropshire Council has been judged as Outstanding by Ofsted inspectors. This is massive testament to the hard work and dedication of everybody involved in the service and they can justifiable be very proud of their achievement. As an administration we now need to replicate that across the rest of the organisation. Casework has been around planning and happening later in September to see enforcement, but also highways mainte-

nance, boundary issues, rights of way, trees, utility services, footpath repairs, road signs, bus stops and service deliv-

On Highways maintenance I talked with Park Hall Countryside Experience, residents and with Keir about the works on North Drive. I also met Multevo on site to discuss their road closures on Ellesmere Road. I have had plenty of feed back on both sets of roadworks and I will be working to make sure those problems aren't repeated.

meetings over the balance of August

and early September showed the drop off while people were away. As we moved into the 2nd week of August, I was talking to Tedsmore residents and officers about Tedsmore Hall planning applications, culminating in a meeting with residents about their future options. Residents had significant concerns about the plans, which had grown significantly over the previous weekend. The applicant withdrew the application soon after with the case officer siting concerns that couldn't be resolved by a few tweaks. Undoubtably a good outcome for residents. I had a meeting with the Chief financial officer and another portfolio holder about how to use CIL to earn more money for Shropshire Council.

I had a successful meeting with the Head of Property at Shropshire Council which has giving me a better understanding around issues in the property portfolio. A joint meeting between departments around the portfolio will be

what leverage we can get out of the assets to deliver more affordable housing. economic or other development. The objective being to maximise the value of the portfolio and deliver the priorities of the administration.

I attended a site visit at Shrewsbury Flaxmill for a meeting with Historic England to discuss their future plans for the site. The transformation was incredible from when I was mapping the site 20 years ago. I can recommend going on the tour, particularly the tower tour. September started as August finished with some strategic visits to potential developers interested in putting sites forward for the new local plan, in various parts of the county. Various other briefings with officers around the emerging Supplementary Planning Documents that will be considered by Cabinet this week. However, a big chunk of my time in September has already been around the year-end financial projections contained in the period 4 report to Cabinet. In the first 3 months we had seen some positive improvement in the General Reserves. The 4th month had seen a dramatic and alarming shift. As previously reported Shropshire Council's reserves were far too low, leaving the council vulnerable to external events. Reserves were around £600k instead of £15-20million. However, the period 4 report now shows a year end projection of minus 890k, which is illegal. Should that negative position continue then the Chief Financial Officer (CFO) will have to effectively declare the council bankrupt and call in Government Commissioners to run the council. The CFO is the only person who can make that decision. Officers and members across the council want to avoid that at all costs. Cabinet are being asked in the budget. For example, the Green to declare a 'financial emergency' by

the CFO. In practice this means a ban on all but essential spending for the remainder of the financial year. The CFO believes there is time to recover the situation before he has to make that decision. This is a particularly grim news. Commissioners will impose massive cuts and big rises in charges and council

Why is Shropshire Council in this mess? For the previous 4 financial years savings have not been delivered. This financial year, the budget agreed by the last administration needed to make £60million worth of savings. That number included £25million worth of savings in previous year's budget which weren't made. Many savings have been unrealistic and undeliverable, but did balance the budget. In March the council took out a loan to help balance the budget. In August Shropshire Council had a corporate peer review which has pointed out the failures of the previous 4 financial years and issues extending further back. That report will be published soon, and it isn't a pretty read. The review recommended that the council urgently appoint an external, independently chaired, improvement board to help turn the council around. The Veolia contract is ripping off Shropshire residents. The contract runs until 2039 – the cost to buy out the contract is £140million at present. The contract is costing the council 10x more than any other similar contract in the country. Veolia gets an automatic uplift of inflation +2.5% every year. If they put in a planning application Shropshire Council have even had to pay their planning fees. This year alone the contract will be going up from £43million to £44million. It is safe to say that there have been far too many unforced errors

Bin charge. The charge was budgeted for a 70% uptake. The research survey predicted 56% uptake with the charge. With the charge in place the actual uptake is 55%. Using an optimistic budget figure that was unjustified and not evidenced has left a £600k hole in the budget. Just appalling way to run any budget. But this cavalier budgeting has been going on for quite a few years. Cuts that have taken place have even hurt the councils own ability to generate revenue.


In other news there are 240 estates across the county waiting to get their roads adopted. I have a number in the this division that I have been discussing with residents. This backlog has been building for 10 years! With the new mandatory housing targets virtually doubling the housing requirement across the county, this problem will

only increase at a faster rate. I am working with officers on a "bold" plan which promises to get on top of the problem very quickly. That would benefit around 3,000 residents in Shropshire. Hopefully this works but I will report back on this as things develop further.

Yesterday Cabinet voted to approve West Felton PC's request to have a Neighbourhood Plan Area. The Cabinet also voted to declare a financial emergency and to stop all non-essential spending.

Hopefully, next month I can report something more positive in a number of areas.





The feeling in September of the beginning of a new gardening year leads to placing the annual seed order. We were not happy with a couple of alternative varieties bought last October because our usual ones were no longer available, so this year will search alternative suppliers in the hope of getting what we want. We will also continue our campaign to reduce the amount of bedding in favour of more perennials. With a lull in the treadmill of breeding, feed- I recently came across a Chinese provis one of life's little pleasures.

There is still some harvesting in October, including apples and squash, and tunnels can be removed from carrots and leeks. We harvested potatoes earlier in September this year hoping to reduce slug damage. The glasshouses will be cleaned and tender plants brought in to over winter. Outside, the winter pruning will be underway as well as any projects to make changes in the garden. High on my list is to severely cut back overgrown shrubs and to make some developments in hard landscaping. But then, I make the same vow

to cut back shrubs every year and never



WHAT'S YOURS IS MINE, AND WHAT'S MINE IS ME OWN

West Felton Rector, Alan Brannigan, September 1994

It's reassuring to note that, in an age when all old records must be deposited with the County Archivist, that in the tower of St. Michael's Church there remains the oldest record of land ownership in the parish. It is on a large painted board, precisely dated at July 23rd, 1718, and records not only who owned or tenanted land, but what were the tithes paid by farmers and landowners to the church.

It uses the old Township names, i.e. Felton Township, Twyford Township, Sandford Township, Tedsmere Township, Yardeston Township, and fields are named which it would now be difficult to identify.

Similarly, hardly any of the names mentioned can still be found here, although in their time they were men of substance. Nathanial Thomas, William Rogers, Richard Jones, Edward Lloyd, Robert Lathrop, Thomas Bentley, Joseph Withers; you wonder who they all were, and what happened to them.

Where, I wonder, was Hungerhill Field, or Lowries Yard or Broad Meadow Field or Tedsmere Lane?

But amongst all the other things about which we may speculate, one thing continues to fascinate me. The land holdings are not measured in ways which we would understand, that is, acres and the like, but in what is called "Oswestry Old Measure". What would be the modern equivalent of "six strikes seedness" or "six hoops seedness"? Was there a change like the more recent decimalisation or metrication, and when did it happen? Did the farmers of the eighteenth century lament the passing of Oswestry Old Measure as a big con trick, as many commonly saw decimalisation, and how long did they go on thinking in the old ways, as many of us still think of pounds, shillings and pence? The fact that none of this is going to shake the foundations of society doesn't make it any the less intriguing.

The small pieces of a jigsaw are just as important as the large. •




future. The former however has led to the institution of Safeguarding and Disclosure and Baring service certificates. For ordinary mortals like 15 clergy posts to fill and he is more PCC members, these can be done online, but for clergy a whole day at the Diocese is required together with the writing of essays reflecting on what they have learnt. All this training has triggered a defensive attitude to approaching people alone. Dropping in on a parishioner for a chat or a cup of tea is now viewed as a dangerous activity, laying oneself open to accusations of misconduct. Numbers are now seen as safe – visiting the local coffee morning or parish fête is less liable to cause problems.

Once again our parish is saddled with an Interregnum. We are greatly indebted to all the retired clergy who come and take services for us. It plied, an interesting dialogue might is amazing what the retired clergy will do and we are grateful to those like Robin Martin who are getting on in years and still keep helping us out. We are not alone as a parish in having no priest. Over 25% of parishes in the Lichfield Diocese are without clergy: in the Oswestry Deanery it is 43%. The Bishop cheerfully reminded us that West Felton is third in line to be filled after the Trefonen group of parishes and the Kinnerley group. Trefonen has advertised twice and had no applicants. Clergy

can pick and choose. Recent data show that ordinands have fallen to 370/year whilst last year 531 clergy retired. The Archdeacon of Salop has concerned about lack of clergy than shortage of money. Parishes should not be in a rush to appoint anyone who appears unsuitable. A former Dean of Ely has warned parishes in an interregnum against appointing a person in desperation since "disastrous results can follow".

At a recent Deanery synod meeting, the possibility of asking the Diocese for help in making a parish or Benefice attractive was raised. Many parish profiles have great similarities and are not particularly enticing. Inviting clergy to come and have a look and asking them to suggest what might make the job appealing was suggested, Assuming anyone apensue. It may well be the case that financial terms come into play At present incumbents get no payments for taking weddings and funerals which hardly encourages enthusiasm for undertaking these tasks. Time for change?

Inevitably we are going to have a long interregnum and may well end up being incorporated into a Minster model. In the meantime we are grateful to our retired clergy for helping us out.●

Changes ...

This month's article is something of a milestone. It is 10 years since I started writing these articles for the magazine in September 2015. That only 115 articles have appeared is accounted for by a missing article in March 2016 and the magazine not appearing during some months of the Covid Lockdown. The number has been bolstered by two eulogies, one for Ken Gull, erstwhile churchwarden, and one for Barbara Brewster who used to live at 45 Woolston Road.

The first article included a tribute to Rev Tony Sparham who had recently retired from being our House for duty priest. The item recorded the esteem in which he was held, his knowledge of theology and his willingness to visit and engage with the wider community. Little did I think that 10 years thence I would once again be taking up my pen to record that in that time, we should have seen two rectors and one curate depart and we are now in an interregnum (Vacancy) of 12 months. With hindsight, I should not have been surprised. Clergy rarely stay in post longer than 5-6 years these days and vacancies of over a year are common.

The older clergy opine that an average of 5 years in a post is too short a

time to settle down and serve the community and the church. And not only do clergy not stay long in a post, but the qualities that Tony Sparham exhibited of a good theological knowledge and pastoral care are sadly lacking. Both in the National and Church press articles have appeared remarking upon the decline in the standard of people being ordained. The difficulty of finding anybody of the stature of William Temple or Michael Ramsay to fill the post of Archbishop of Canterbury has been the subject of comment and the intellectual calibre, or lack of it, in the candidates has been cause for lament.

Theology and pastoral care were embedded in the education of priests in training at Theological college. Nowadays many clergy are ordained after following a less rigorous course. Yet theology can be learnt on the job. Stretton Reeves, a Bishop of Lichfield in the mid 20th century, was noted for ringing up his clergy and asking what they were doing. If not studying the Bible in the morning or not visiting in the afternoon, they were guilty of idling. Whilst Bible study can still be undertaken, visiting and pastoral care have become a problem.

Misbehaviour and eccentric conduct by the clergy merits an article in the
