## Report from West Felton Parish Chairman, Cllr John Thornhill

Flooding in West Felton near Tedsmore Road. In the April edition I commented on the response from John Bellis of Shropshire Council to our unease regarding continued flooding. The Clerk wrote to him expressing the Members' surprise and concern regarding the pipe being only 9 inches with a request for his thoughts. So far, we have still not received a reply despite a reminder.

**Rednal Battery Plant.** Council further discussed this application with members having provided more relevant information. We have submitted a detailed response as below.

Noise pollution. The increase in noise is acknowledged in the application and mitigation of fencing is promised. However, in the consultee comments SC Regulatory are recommending refusal. Local residents will undoubtedly suffer from a significant increase in decibels to high, continuous levels both day and night. There does not seem to be any relevant or detailed proposal for mitigating sound pollution.

Whilst mitigation is included with the provision of an acoustic fence, there is no data indicating by how much decibel levels would be reduced. The noise survey needs to be clarified, as to whether the noise readings men-

tioned are with or without the acoustic fence. If they are without, then expected levels with the fence need to be provided, and if they are with the fence then the mitigation proposals are totally inadequate.

Fire and hazardous fumes. There is a known fire risk from lithium-ion batteries and subsequent thermal runaway. We understand that Battery Energy Storage Systems (BESS) thermal runaway occurs when a damaged lithium-ion battery cell releases flammable or toxic gases, triggering a chain reaction that spreads to adjacent cells. As this process accelerates, extreme heat and pressure build up, significantly increasing the risk of fires or explosions. Should this occur then there is a significant risk of widespread pollution to the surrounding area.

Traffic. There are concerns about the impact on the local highways, particularly as the construction phase will take up to twelve months and involve heavy construction vehicles and cranes. Vehicles would access the site through the A5/Queens Head junction, where SC highways as consultee highlights the number of serious collisions. Traffic would then travel along the Rednal straight which is

(Continued from page 9)Parish Council report heavily used already by traffic to and from ABP Ltd and in a very poor state of repair with many deep potholes. The impact on this road of many more heavy vehicles over an extended period of time is of great concern.

Scale. The scale of the proposed plant is huge and would affect sight lines and lead to an adverse visual impact in the countryside.

Consultation. The level of consultation for a development of such significance is totally insufficient. The consultation was conducted by a leaflet drop, with only a two week window for comments and no face to face meetings. The leaflet was arguably misleading and gave no indication of the scale of the proposed development. Furthermore, the residents who will be significantly affected by increased noise levels have not been notified of the planning application, and the site notice was displayed late, Council. some time after 1st June.

We would encourage individuals to make your own representations to Shropshire Council planning allocations site using the Ref no 25/01250/ FUL.

Defibrillator. When the defibrillator was installed, training was provided for members to be able to operate it. It is now time to renew that training as this must be undertaken every two years. The Clerk has enquired of the

first responders to ask if they would assist with this. So far we have not received a reply.

Annual Parish Meeting. This meeting was held on Tuesday 20<sup>th</sup> May 2025 in the School. It was disappointing that no members of the parish other than the ones representing various organisations and presenting reports attended.

#### Site meeting with Shropshire

Council. In previous reports I referred the failure of Shropshire Council to respond to our request for a site visit to consider three main issues. A further request was made in the first week of June and a positive response resulted in a site visit held on Tues morning between the PC Clerk Rosemary Wood, Chair of the PC John Thornhill and a representative of the Highways Department of Shropshire Council, Harry Guest on 10th June 2025. A full report was presented to

We had a positive discussion about Oak Lane Farm parking, the placement of Conservation Area Signs and Vehicle Activated Speed signs (VAS). Following our discussion we visited Oak Lane where relevant measurements were taken to consider the viability of a lay-by. The possible site would only allow for no more than three cars and affect the amity and quality of the grass verge and Council agreed not to pursue the matter fur-

ther.

We then visited six other sites including The Avenue, Threadneedle Street, and Woolston Road. The Clerk's report was discussed and it was agreed to present a more detailed proposal to the July Council meeting. In the meantime quotations will be sought for both Conservation and VAS signs.

Neighbourhood Plan. It was agreed to move this forward and engage with parishioners. The Council will be pre-

sent at a stall during the Village Fete and you are welcome to come and express your views and complete a questionnaire about the needs of the village.

Letter to Helen Morgan. We discussed a letter received from our MP and agreed to respond to her on a number of items including postal facilities for the parish, travel facilities infrastructure, the provision for internet and telephone access.

## **Shropshire Council Report: May 2025**

Cllr David Walker, Shropshire Council: Whittington Division

Firstly, thank you for the kind words and support during the election.

The council's overall position was set in the budget, which was adopted last been engaged by the previous council January. This is the envelope within which the new administration will have to operate this year:

Savings required this year: £57m

Reserves: £5m (audit says SC should have £15-20m)

CIL money: £30m unspent

Overspend: projected to be £34m. One department accounted for almost half of that.

The last admin borrowed £26.9m in March to avoid bankruptcy and balance the budget. That will cost £1.3m in interest a year from the council's revenue.

Price Waterhouse Coopers (PWC) had to identify savings, but PWC are costing the council £17,000 a day. Many of the existing savings identified aren't achievable.

Alarmingly, the council has had no controls in place for any contracts, making monitoring of performance and outcomes almost impossible. Yet Kier Group's highways/maintenance contract was extended for a year just before the election.

Overall, there is a 2-year backlog for adopting new roads and for Traffic Regulation Orders. Channels of com-

munication internally and externally are now very poor. The new administration is determined to improve this, transparency and partnership working.

Shropshire Council's corporate structure has already been moved away from departmental siloes to a leadership board, with staff reporting to multiple members of the board. The Chief Executive believes this will even out resources across the council structure and encourage more joined -up working. The new structure started in January, but the website still reflects the old structure.

So far, the new administration group has selected a Leader and Deputy Leader and, this week, the cabinet members. These executive positions will be formally ratified at the Full Council meeting on May 22nd. The Leader-elect has asked me to join the Cabinet to oversee Planning, including the Local Plan. Once all of the remaining annual meetings are complete this week, I will be able to dive into my new role properly.

Members are now undergoing induction training, which is to conclude in July.

On Friday 9th of May, I signed my Declaration of Acceptance of Office at my first induction session, which included official photos, collecting passes and IT equipment. At the same

time, my council email went live.

I don't have a council mobile yet, but I will let everyone know the number when it becomes available. Members can be assured that I will be answering both.

Existing emails and numbers are fine, but it will keep things simpler from a General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR) perspective if Shropshire Council stuff is separate from my personal emails.

Since then, I have had a steady stream of casework, predominantly on planning matters and parking enforcement issues, along with the fallen tree limb on Twyford Lane fouling the overhead cables.

I contacted Freedom Fibre and Ben Walker about the fibre rollout in West Felton, which seems to have gone very quiet - Freedom Fibre pulled out of Project Gigabyte in Cheshire recently. Residents have been concerned that they had gone bust at one extreme, to questioning the delays at the other. As far as I am aware, only Tedsmore is connected. I was expecting everywhere to become available in January/February. Freedom Fibre seemed quite evasive when I asked them about progress.

I attended a briefing with Andy Wilde, Head of Infrastructure. There has been a marked shift in the approach to road maintenance to push surface dressing much earlier in a road's life than I was trained to see nearly 35 years ago. Modelling has shown that the cost per meter repaired for early intervention is a tiny fraction of a later traditional intervention. So newer stretches of road will now also see work undertaken to keep them like new. The council is trying to spread scarce resources and improve the rating of the whole network. Overall, for every road type, Shropshire's roads are in far worse condition than the country's average. Mr Wilde said that some roads will get worse as a result and be pushed towards the critical end of the assessment. With 80% of the network being rural roads, it is easy to see where that will fall. I will be digging into this further, as this does appear counterintuitive.

The provisional cabinet met with senior officers and the Local Government Association (LGA) to discuss the

shape of things to come. A further meeting took place between the provisional Cabinet and the Leadership Board of Shropshire Council to develop that further.

So far. Heather Kidd, Leader-elect, has set out some broad themes around the garden waste collection charges, use of consultancy, improving the way contracts are managed, improving the quality of highways maintenance, and better partnership working with town & parish councils. She requested a government offramp for the £215m North West Relief Road (NWRR) project, like the one Norfolk CC obtained. At present it will cost the Council £39m to stop the project or £215m to complete it. Neither of which the council can afford or deliver for Shropshire. The PWC contract has now been stopped.

There is a significant number of issues dating back some years that I will be picking up in relation to the Parish Council and more widely. I will be using my role to get some progress on those issues and to better communicate with both Parishes in Whittington Division. There is undoubtedly a very large job ahead on many fronts and I will keep everybody informed as things develop.

members. Full Council has taken place, so everyone has been appointed to their various roles and responsibilities. As previously alluded to, I am now the Cabinet member responsible for Planning. Specifically: Local Plan, Development Management, Planning Policy, Enforcement, CIL, Building Control, Natural and Historic Environment. I have had various meetings with officers to dig into my responsibilities.

Following last month's meetings, I have taken up the long-standing outstanding issues with officers at Shropshire Council and National Highways. I have worked and will continue to work to unblock Community Infra**structure Levy** (CIL) spending where Shropshire Council have been blocking progress for one reason or another, particularly those where both West Felton and Whittington have money set aside to deliver a project. The CIL Local fund isn't working effectively, and I have asked officers to that there is more transparency in the on the agenda. Most notably: the fiprocess and that things are communi- nancial outturn for 2024/25 and Telcated back to parishes, whether good Internal Infrastructure Group (IIG) was an officer group with no member input that allocated CIL Local funds. I have said that needs to change. CIL funds need to be released to enable projects to proceed.

On the Local Plan officers have set out their timetable for the new draft plan. They are waiting for new government guidance before they formally commence the 30-month preparation period, but they have been gathering evidence in readiness. They expect to formally start next year with adoption in Autumn 2028. This process needs to be in line with the latest National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF). Shropshire Council know their overall housing target thanks to the National Standard Needs Assessment methodology. However, they will need to review the settlement hierarchy and site allocations in light of the NPPF changes. As such there will be a new call for sites and this will take place imminently. Again, I have asked that there is more member involvement in this, where previously there was none, with better publicity when the call is made. I have also asked officers to promote Neighbourhood Plans more.

Cabinet meets next Wednesday for review its operation. I have also asked the first time with a number of items ecare charging structure consultation. or bad news, rather than nothing. **CONCLUSION** - The climate has changed lately with fewer small, local traders wanting to advertise. Enquiries now come through the website, from Shrewsbury, etc. We are also getting much more community information from our local Police Force, Healthwatch, local government etc.

Whilst it has been a bit of a struggle financially, otherwise I feel we have had a successful year. Many people express their enjoyment and admiration for the magazine, and we have had several unexpected successes. All in all, I think we are still a great community asset. livered last year. Cabinet will consider changes to Telecare to bring us more in line with other councils.

For my portfolio Cabinet will consider an application from Bayston Hill PC to Fixing more potholes and improving define a Neighbourhood Plan area. Bayston Hill Parish Council cite the lack of a local plan as the reason for their application. A growing number of councils are now talking to Shropshire Council with a view to applying to the council to define their plan areas. Once a plan area is approved by cabinet the establishment of a community steering group can be done. Yet, grant funding for 2025/26 has not been announced. I have asked Julia Buckley MP and Helen Morgan MP to tackle the government about the grants as a matter of urgency.

I have written to the Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) to ask why West Mercia had a lower profile online for the Operation Sceptre – the national campaign to cut knife crime. I also asked why Police Community Support Officer (PCSO) hours were changing with shifts finishing at 8pm. As I understand it the PCSO who revealed this has now been suspended. In the PCC's reply he pointed out that the consultation was internal so he couldn't reveal much beyond that the evidence shows antisocial behaviour incidents drop off dramatically after 8pm. But as we know rural crime doesn't stop at night.

Over the month the new administration has been setting out their priorities and how they are addressing them.

#### Actions so far:

- If you use the park and ride in Shrewsbury then you might like to know that the frequency is increasing to a bus every 12 minutes instead of 20 minutes, from the end of June.

the work of the deliverers, all 32 of them, some of whom have been treading the highways and lanes for years, and others who volunteered in the last few months. It is still a wonder to me how easy it is to find replacement deliverers when someone needs to retire. Grateful too to Priyank and colleagues in the shop who accommodate 20 magazines in their retail space. I am truly grateful for the goodwill and enthusi-

asm of the people of West Felton.

Dot and Kathy Bliss (and sometimes David) are still doing a sterling job dealing with the heavy boxes of magazines, reducing them to organised bundles for rapid distribution around the village and nearby hamlets. At the last count we are covering 765 households! And any extras go to people in Whittington, Ruyton, and Oswestry who are very pleased to get a free, good read. This of course, widens the scope for our advertisers as well.

**PRINTING** - Our long-time printing firm increased their price twice in 2024, leaving us in deficit overall. We regularly sought quotes from local printers and this year we found a Shrewsbury firm that is able to meet our requirements, ie. a lower price and a shorter turnaround. This will be beneficial to the community as the various organisations holding meetings through the month are often under pressure to meet the 10th of the month deadline. A trial order of the March issue was deemed satisfactory, with many noticing the improved quality, of printing, paper and general presentation. The turnaround was also satisfactory, so we have committed to the Shrewsbury firm going forward.

ADVERTISING - In 2024 we lost a number of advertisers and worked hard to replace them but still failed to cover the cost of printing. We didn't increase the advertising charges in 2024, that was a mistake. This year we increased just enough to cover outgoings, in the

- chasing officers for various site meetings across both parishes.




## West Felton Women's Institute

## Sp the Earden Path with Topiarius

#### Water, water

The copy for the magazine has to be submitted a month or more in advance. hence the May heat wave had not arrived when the June article was written. The high temperatures and cloudless skies necessitated a lot of watering. We have a network of hosepipes to cover the garden and one upgrade this year was to install multiway taps to lessen the amount of connection changing. Hose fittings from the major manufacturers are ridiculously expensive but I discovered a range of much cheaper but still high quality alternatives made by the St Helens House and Garden company. I bought them from CPC.

Actually, the most difficult part of watering was not the garden but seeds and seedlings. I put trays of seeds into polyethylene bags to retain moisture while germination takes place, but this year many had to be moved from their usual place to the shade to stop overheating. Then, it was something of a battle to keep the resulting seedlings moist in the much higher than usual temperatures because they must have light. Watering at least twice a day was the norm and we did lose a few. The weather did of course eventually break and at the end of May the rain came in a quantity to make up for the drought. I would prefer less all or nothing.

Every year I remind you that July is a

good time to make an assessment of the garden so that changes can be planned. In advance of our assessment towards the end of the month, I can be sure to predict that there will be a lot of cutting back and/or removal of shrubs to be noted. This is inevitable in a mature garden and, in our case, will be amplified by failure to do as much as we should have done in previous years. It is an old story, the plants grow steadily but you don't notice until they have got much too big, and then it becomes a major job to get them back in order. If the list of major jobs gets too long you run out of time before it is completed.

Before we get to the assessment there are the routine jobs. My list for July has perhaps shortened a little from the previous months but not a lot. There are kale and cabbage plants to be moved to the vegetable plot and also lettuce plants. The second batch of cucumbers need potting on and seedlings such as chard and beetroot thinned. Mesh tunnels will have to be put over carrots and leeks to prevent insect attack, and I will be watching brassicas for any sign of caterpillars when the sprayer will be put into action. Summer pruning will be done this month on shrubs such as cytissus and genista, and that includes any topiary and hedges. Add to that the usual feeding, weeding and watering and you will not be short of a job. ●

(Continued from page 33 - Assisted dying to look after people whose life has no future.

There may be two groups of people for which assisted dying may be considered. The first includes those people with terminal disease. How long terminal means is not easy to measure. It is not possible to calculate how much they suffer – they may be in a land of their own – but remorseless pain requires relief. Such unfortunate people often have their pain abbreviated by medical means which at the same time shortens their lives.

Possibly the group that causes the greatest anguish includes those people whose condition, be it inherited, acquired or following trauma, can be kept alive, often at some cost. This group would give the Bishop of London the greatest disquiet. They may be vulnerable and often be the subject of abuse through frustration rather than wilful cruelty. Such people may be disabled in body but not in mind. Examples include Stephen Hawking, the renowned physicist. His mind was active and capable of original thought for many years while his body was kept going by those devoted to him. In earlier times the introduction of the iron lung to keep polio patients alive was a medical step forward. However this meant lying a metal box with only your head outside. The ability to do anything was minimal. It might be thought that de-

pression and a desire to end one's life would be considerable, but such data as are available do not suggest this was a problem. Fortunately many patients were in the iron lung for a relatively short time.

The vulnerability to which this second group is exposed may not be due to pressure from relatives or carers but from society. Actions of government to save or raise money may perversely put people at risk. Although the Bishop of London objects to discussion of costs, this is already in place with governments seeking to restrict the costs of medicines by putting a value on a quality adjusted life year. A recent sad story related to a farmer who took his own life to avoid saddling his son with death duties.

Ultimately a government is dependent on what the voters want it to do and if people feel that assisted dying is desirable or that taxation for welfare is getting too much, the effect will be felt at the ballot box.

## **ASSISTED DYING BILL** has divided the **Church of England**

It is not long since the subject of assisted dying appeared in the magazine. Such has been the interest and the movement of opinion in parliament against it and people discussing it that a further article with similar and new points may be in order.

Assisted dying has split the Church of England. Most of the church hierarchy have positioned themselves against it with some notable exceptions. Undoubtedly the MP who introduced the bill was courageous. She feels that now is the time for serious debate. Assisted dying is legal in many countries and does not appear to have been abused. Relatively few people have taken advantage of the change in the law.

Early theologians taught that God united himself to us in suffering and death and that we can imitate Christ in suffering and death. A Regius Professor of Divinity wrote that "Christ passed through every stage of life, becoming like us in each, so that we imitate him in whichever stage, including suffering and death, we find ourselves". Does this mean that we have to suffer in order to follow the way of Christ? Another argument put forward is that of the sanctity of life namely that life is the responsibility

of God alone, even if suffering is bevond comprehension. Many people feel that these positions are not consistent with a compassionate Lord, and that amelioration of suffering is reasonable. The most notable churchman who supports assisted dying is Lord Carey, an erstwhile Archbishop of Canterbury. He believes that there is no fundamental theological reason for opposition. In the face of such varied views it is easy to understand how divisions arise.

Those against change also include the palliative care community, and agencies caring for the disabled. They fear that patients may be coerced for financial or social reasons. Some doctors have reservations about being involved in assisted dying. In the past a person suffering because medical science had nothing to offer may have had their life ended with dignity at home.

The Bishop of London has objected to the bill mentioning the economic value of assisted dying. The costs for domiciliary care, palliative care, pensions and other state benefits all form part of the bill. Undoubtedly some patients do feel that they are a burden on their families and on society. This is often enhanced by the reaction of their families or indeed people caring for them. It is often underappreciated how stressful it is for carers

#### Dear Resident,

I am writing to ask your views about access to services in your area - specifically regarding Post Office services in light of recent changes.

If you are not already aware, the Post Office has announced that it will no longer be offering outreach services in West Felton from 17th June onwards. West Felton is one of several areas in North Shropshire losing its outreach services. This is because the staff member who currently runs the services is resigning and it is Post Office policy not to restore a service after an unplanned closure, unless it is necessary to meet access criteria.

I am disappointed by this news as I believe that services in rural areas need to be improved, not reduced. I have already met Post Office representatives to make this clear, however, it would strengthen my case to be able to share first-hand testimonies from constituents like you.

#### Women in Utilities Awards 2025


Nominated for APPRENTICE OF THE YEAR
