Percy's Pals help patients with non-medical needs at The Robert Jones and Agnes Hunt Orthopaedic Hospital (RJAH).

The new initiative is spearheaded by the League of Friends and is targeted at reducing low spirits and morale amongst patients on the Sheldon Ward.

The Sheldon Ward offers general medicine, dementia care, and rehabilitation for aging patients, many of whom spend extended periods in hospital before moving to care homes or their own homes.

"The role is focused on being a positive opportunity for individuals to befriend patients, encouraging open conversations about hobbies and interests, while actively promoting fluid intake and identifying simple ways to enhance patient comfort."








cemetery). Tithe, meaning one tenth of income, would be collected from the people. In Felton, this would go to pay the clergy.

In the bell tower of St Michael's church hangs a board listing all the tithes. From the spelling probably written in the 18th Century.

There would also have been a mill. The people, in return for their land, worked the lord's land at harvest time, plus sessions of ploughing, mowing and reaping. They could be called upon at any time to do the lord's work.

They were also expected to give a chicken and a gift worth a penny to their lord's lady at Christmas time. This may sound harsh, but the lord was their protector. In a book written by R. Kenyon "After the Middle Ages the horizon was pushed back a little for the common people and many times the Lord of the lands called for two hundred men from Felton to follow him to war in Wales, Scotland, France or the Civil War."

We are fortunate that today we can still see the Mound and part of the moat in what was the farmvard of Manor Farm, situated close to St. Michael's church. It was from here that the village of Felton grew.

In the reign of King Stephen, about 1155, Felton was included in the manor of Ruyton XI Towns, the only place in England to have roman numerals in its name.



The eleven towns were Ruyton, Coton, Shelvock, Shottaton, Wykey, Eardiston, Haughton, Rednal, Sutton, Tedsmore and Felton.

William fitz Alan gave The Manor of Felton to John le Strange.

By 1240 John was dead and was succeeded by his co-heiresses. In 1301 the Earl of Arundel became Lord of Ruyton and over-lord of the Manor of Felton.

In the 1350s Hugh fitz Philip took a house and land in Felton from the Earl and produced a deed showing his right to take pasturage and turf in the lord's land in Felton. A year later William de Hampton produced a deed by which **Hugh fitz Philip of West Felton** had the same rights (it was here that the addition of "West" appears for the first time).

The Manor House passed to the Lords Craven, Lord of the Manor of Ruyton, and about 1777 the Manor House was bought from the lord by the Frank family and remained in the family until the early 1900s. In the churchyard close to the Manor House are the tombstones of the Frank family. ♦

WEST FELTON VILLAGE THE BEGINING

By Ann Evans, at the turn of the century.

West Felton lies approximately five miles south of Oswestry, and was once a thriving farming community.

With the coming of the new by-pass in the 1980s, the village has grown and is now home to many new people from various walks of life and occupations.

The village is divided in two by the A5. The original grew up around the church of St. Michael the Archangel. The main part of the village, the shop/post office, and public house, on the old A5, was once part of Twyford.

West Felton is mentioned in the Domesday Book. In the reign of Edward the Confessor, Seward was owner of the Manor of Felton, which contained half a hide of land and employed a plough with one team of oxen, but the area was mostly waste. It continued the same throughout William the Conqueror's reign. It eventually passed to Alan fitz Flaald and from him to his son William fitz Alan of Whittington Castle.

Of the ancient inhabitants of West Felton, little is known. Certainly the Anglo-Saxons were here, and from the close proximity of the Old Fort at Oswestry, possibly Iron Age people.

In the 1950s axe heads from the Stone Age, were found by a Mr Roberts from St Martins doing drainage work at Manor Farm. These can be seen in the Rowley Museum, Shrewsbury.

More recently three axe-heads from the Bronze Age, dated about three thousand years old, were found on farmland at Rednal. They were in remarkable condition and can now be see at the museum in Oswestry library.

The Romans closely settled in the district and their habitations and roads can be traced throughout. There is believed to have been a Roman settlement at Twyford, also one at Sandford. These places would only have been moated farms or villas, some camps or military posts.

The mound by the Church was a typical settlement in Saxon times. The chief man of the village, the lord, would have had his manor house built there, surrounded by a moat. He would appoint a bailiff who In his absence would be responsible for looking after the people, collecting their taxes and keeping law and order. Each of the families would be given a strip of land, approximately 8 to 12 hectares, depending on the type of land. Here they would build a wooden hut, this would be surrounded by an earth bank and ditch, topped with a fence or hedge. Outside of this would be their pasture or cultivated land. Each household would have their own strip, and a large area of common land for use by all.

This community would have a church and a tithe barn. (A tithe barn in excellent repair can be found in the grounds of The Old Farm, opposite the new


No 'staff' problems this year. Dot and Kathy Bliss continue to do their important job, hospital visits, hip operation etc. notwithstanding.



yard of the Nursery the column of a sundial which came from Llwynymaen is preserved; the head of the column is square, and on one side is the date 1607 and the design I.H.S.; on another side the age of the world is recorded "A.M. 5569;" on the third side the double eagle of Prussia is displayed, and on the fourth the initials

"ELLI." The interior of the Nursery, with its exquisite library and its interesting antiquarian objects, was also thrown open to the visitors. Here there is preserved probably the only, or at any rate the chief piece of household furniture that Kynaston the Wild possessed: it is a three-legged stool with a back rest formed of a piece of board rudely nailed to the edge of the stool. On the seat the initials "H.K." and the date 1564 are engraved. In the grounds there is also to be seen an obelisk erected on a druidical mound in memory of the late Mr Councillor The genial host explained that in 1829 some Dovaston. repairs were done to the chancel of the church at West Felton, and in the progress of the work the body of a Miss Sarah Duckett was disturbed. The late Mr Dovaston was very much offended at the disturbance of the remains. and to avoid a similar experience in his own case he determined to erect a cromlech for the reception of his own remains, and around the cromlech he placed nine boulder stones in order to give the erection a druidical appear-The cromlech was completed, and some time afterwards he dreamt that he was dead, and in that state he was seized with a desire to visit his groves at West Felton. When there he dreamt that he went to see the cromlech, and there he saw a monument erected with his name engraved on it, the date of his birth, the date of his death, and an epitaph-

> Happy I lived, and peaceful died, Nature my light, and God my guide; Thankful 'mid ev'ry blessing given, For truth on earth has trust in Heaven.

The late Mr Dovaston always kept a slate and pencil by his bedside, and he got up and recorded his dream. For many years he believed he should be buried in his own grounds, and in every will he made until the last one



he inserted a proviso that unless he was so buried his successor should forfeit £500 to the Salop Infirmary. When he made his last will he made Mr Williams of the firm of Longueville, Jones, and Williams his executor, and again he wanted the same clause inserted. Mr Williams persuaded Mr Dovaston to leave the matter to him as he was anxious to avoid any contention about the will. The

matter was left to Mr Williams with the result that Mr. Dovaston was buried with his forefathers. When he died, he (the host) considered the story to be too good to be forgotten, and so he perpetuated it by the erection, on the cromlech, of a monument with Mr Dovaston's name, the date of his birth, the date of his death, and the epitaph already quoted. The inscription is "John Freeman Millward Dovaston, M.A., Born 30th December, 1782, Died 3rd August, 1854." At the Nursery the excursionists were most hospitably entertained at luncheon in a tent which was erected on the lawn. Here the company was joined and the Misses Dovaston, the Mr M. and the Hon Mrs Bulkeley Owen, Mr H. Graham LLoyd, the Rev Mr Moody, Mrs and Miss Kenyon of Pradoe, and others. After luncheon the Rev Canon Lloyd said he wished to express the gratitude of the company to Mr Dovaston for the splendid hospitality with which he had received them. (Cheers.)

On leaving the Nursery the party visited West Felton Church, in which a Norman arcade and a fourteenth century roof are preserved. In the churchyard there is an old dial, apparently much older than the date, 1760. A very perfect beacon-mound a few yards to the west of the Church was On the way to Knockin St. Winiexamined. fred's well at Woolston was visited. Here Mr Dovaston read the following extract from the Dovaston MSS .: - "Of Woolston I never heard anything worth troubling history except the following :- September 13th, 1651. The houses in Woolston of Edward Davies, Ermin Davies (widow). Wm. Footman, John Bailies, William Williams, and Daniel Jeffrey's barn, were all burnt with their corn and household stuff. The parish of West Felton contributed to their relief £20, and Wm. Jones of Sandford, gave them

St Michael's Church, West Felton Easter 1936

Rev RGT Gilman and the church choir,

Rev Gilman was Rector from 1928-1956. He was very high church. In 1933 on July 9th he held a special service at St Chad's for peace and unity in Commemoration of the Oxford Movement (an Anglo-Catholic movement). Many of the services at St Chad's at that time were taken by Rev Owen Jacson of Tedsmore (died in 1935) or JW Lee.

Rev Gilman followed Rev Frank Taylor and was succeeded by Rev KC Millington.

They knew that St Winifred was slain at Holywell by her lover, one of the Princes of Wales; he cut off her head and rolled it down the hill, and where it rested a foun-

tain of water rose up ... The tradition made Holywell famous and Margaret, wife of Henry VII built a beautiful well at Holywell which was to be seen now. At the time of St Winifred's death, the monks of the Abbey of Shrewsbury were not in such good a position as other abbeys, because they had no miracles or traditions and they begged that St Winifred's body be interred at the Abbey at Shrewsbury. That was done, and those who were fanciful said that on the evening before it reached Shrewsbury, St Winifred's body rested at Woolston. In his younger days he remembered people coming to the well at Woolston for the lived at the house used to point out a particular place from which patients could take the water. He believed what he had read out was the true account, but those who were fanciful could take their choice. From Woolston the party resumed the drive to Knockin ...

Since generations of Dovaston men, their sons and nephews were all called John, it is hard to keep in mind who is who.

The man in The Nursery in 1885, and the host at the meeting reported above, was the nephew of JFM Dovaston, (Dec 1782 – Aug 1854) poet and naturalist, the man who hoped to be buried in the Nursery garden.

This is what Ann Evans tells us:

"John FM and a group of famous literary friends always gathered at the Nursery to celebrate William Shakespeare's birthday. At one of these gatherings in 1810, 'An Irregular Ode on Shakespeare Birth' was written. The following text was found in a book of poems by John FM Dovaston. The last part was hand-written by John Dovaston, JFM's nephew:

Written and recited on the occasion of a few literary friends planting a Walnut Tree (having a wine bottle buried under the root, with an appropriate inscription cut thereon with a diamond) in the author's grounds; on that day in 1810 and intending to celebrate it annually. '

'(This was a walnut tree, it was decayed at the root and lately grew at an angle of 45 deg. I removed it and planted another in its place on this my 24th Birthday 12 Sept. 1874. The "wine bottle" under the root was not disturbed.)

Is it still there. Ann wonders?"

Op the Garden Path with Topiarius

Grass or no grass

With all the interest in wild flower meadows, movements like No Mow May and the reduction in the size of gardens, it would not be unreasonable to wonder whether the lawn is becoming extinct. Ben Dark argued that "reports of the lawn's death are surely exaggerated because we need somewhere for a blanket and a Sunday paper." Many people would say "What is the matter with the patio?"

I have always maintained that it is best to have no lawn in a very small garden simply because grass does not rank high enough in the interest stakes when space is at a premium. A small paved area will suffice for recreation. With a larger garden there is no doubt that a lawn is a very pleasant if not essential feature to have. Having said that, a good lawn is not low labour and using a mower can get very hard as you grow older. For that reason, we cut down the size of our lawn area several years ago, and this year cut it back some more.

The alternatives are having longer grass that only needs one or two cuts per year or using artificial turf. We have areas of long grass in wilder parts of the garden but I am not convinced of that approach in a small garden. Despite in the past being very involved with the specification of artificial turf for sports installations, it simply does not seem right to me in a garden. In any case, the high quality materials are prohibitively expensive, not to mention the negative environmental factors.

Going to what is happening in June, we start with the lawn needing mowing, as it will for the rest of the Summer. It may also need weeding and possibly watering.

The landmark event is at the beginning of the month when, subject to unusual late frost, the bedding is planted out. There will also be leeks, runner beans, sweet corn, sprouts and sprouting broccoli plants to go out. Seed sowing includes maincrop carrots, beetroot, succession of lettuce and radish and, late in the month, chard. With all those young plants and emerging seedlings, the last thing you need is a drought, but we must expect watering to be needed on occasions.

In the glasshouse, if you have one, there will be tomato and cucumber plants and also possibly peppers to plant in the border or in growbags/large pots. I have been growing tomatoes in the same space for many years with no problems but I have found it better to put cucumbers into large pots rather than the border.

We use Growmore as a convenient general fertiliser and during June a second application will be made on flower beds and on some vegetables. Later potatoes will need earthing up and there will be the delight of having the first earlies for dinner. Late in the month I have to put fleece tunnels over leeks and carrots. ◆

As we read in the account above, JFM Dovaston was very upset with St. Michael's and vowed that he would not be buried at the church.

On his death in 1854 he was in fact buried in West Felton church at the request of his executor. His successor erected the obelisk on the cromlech with the inscription "John Freeman Dovaston born 30 December 1782, died 8 August 1854" and had the lines he composed carved on it. The obelisk was preserved in the garden of one of the new houses that stand there today.

John Dovaston, the nephew who succeeded him, very much appreciated his predecessors' library. Like them, he also was very interested in antiquities.

In 1883 he was made a JP for Shropshire, he died in 1900. He was succeeded by his son Freeman Dovaston, who died unmarried in 1904. He was succeeded by his brother Daniel who was a solicitor.

Daniel Dovaston died in 1938, his son Daniel succeeded to the estate, he had two children Brian and Dorothy.

In 1966, disillusioned with farming in Britain, the family decided to sell The Nursery estate and emigrate to the Bay of Plenty on North Island New Zealand, Daniel his son, Brian, daughter-in-law Christine and grandchildren, Phillip, Andrew, Daniel and Sara, set sail on the S.S. Northern Star where they established a very successful business in agriculture. A fourth son David was born in New Zealand in 1970.

"Daniel Dovaston senior died in January 1975. Christine died 28th March 2001 aged 64 years, "she was a lovely and genuine lady" Ann recalls.

Traditional v Secular

April 7th 2024 will be remembered with sadness amongst the older people of West Felton. It was the day on which the chapel had its last service. About 50 people attended drawn from Methodist, Anglican and Catholic denominations of the Christian faith. The service was followed by a wonderful feast in good Methodist tradition People remembered the times in their youth when they attended events such as Sunday school there. Passing the chapel as I often do, I feel a certain sense of wretchedness that those people whose names are engraved on the stones in the wall, and indeed many others unnamed, have been let down. In her sermon the Minister recalled that attendance at chapel had been falling until it was no longer viable. Most churches have had that problem. I looked up attendance at services in St Chad's over the past 90 years. In 1934, 52 people attended communion at Easter, in 1964 35 and in 2024 17. On ordinary Sundays attendance at communion has been steady ranging between 7-10 over the same time.

The Minister's words about attendance at church caused me to ponder the reasons for the decline. In doing so I came across an article drawing

attention to the work of Ron Inglehart. Forty years ago Inglehart, a Professor of Political Science at the University of Michigan, started a famous investigation which entailed 130,000 people in 60 different countries being interviewed. Every five years the process was repeated – not with the same people necessarily. Inglehart's hypothesis was that as the world became richer, so people's values would come together. He theorised that insecurity determines how people think. In a world of insecurity the family and religious organisations are the main source of solace. As people become richer and better educated they have more time to think for themselves. He developed two rating axes. On one, vertical, axis lies your position according to such questions as how you rate obedience in children, belief in God, whether you trust people, or whether you would sign a petition. This with tradition at lower end and secular at the upper end, he called the "tradition-secular" axis. On the other, horizontal, axis the extremes lay between survival on the left and self expression on the right. As survival became more important so people stuck together as nations, were fearful of strangers and clustered round institutions. With greater confidence, self expression with independence of thought started to flower.

Inglehart then related the "traditionsecular "axis, with the "survival-self expression" axis... Remarkably, the relationship (correlation) revealed that as self expression increased, so people discarded traditional values and became more secular. Correlations by themselves do not show cause and effect, but there is a prima facie reason to think that the two might be associated. Although peace has reigned for the last 80 years - or at least major wars have not been fought - clergy have commented in the past how wartime, with the accompanying anxiety about security, caused people to attend church. The records for St Chad suggest a modest increase in attendance in 1940 over the late 1930's.

Over the forty years of Inglehart's study, wealth has increased. Only 8% of the world lives in poverty compared with 40% forty years ago. As wealth in a country increases, and is shared with the population, so more

resources flow into education. With education comes learning and discussion. Over the years the Christian church has supported education and the relief of poverty. Such beneficence is worthy, but given the work of Inglehart, it raises the startling possibility that the church is supporting its own demise. As wealth and education increase, so traditions decline and included with those traditions is religious faith.

Such a relationship is already recognised by some cultures in which religion is associated with restriction of freedom, education and clothing, especially in women. People are thus encouraged to maintain tradition and in so doing to suppress self expression — at least publicly. Christianity, having had similar traits, has progressed to encourage education, thus moving towards self expression and independent thought. Along with these attributes comes questioning of religion, and of faith. •
